



- Unclear land tenure status


COMPOUNDED CRISES

- Asylum seeking population
- IDP in transit
- Massive migration
- Insufficient conditions for economic reactivation and livelihood generation
- Exacerbated preexisting conditions

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Main issues



SHELTER RESPONSES

- Overcrowding in host family households
- Duplication of NFI distribution
- Insufficient conditions for economic reactivation and livelihood generation
- Limited availability of land for relocation
- Temporary shelter is de facto permanent
- Families resist temporary shelter solutions while expecting permanent housing
- Families continue living in hazardous areas






