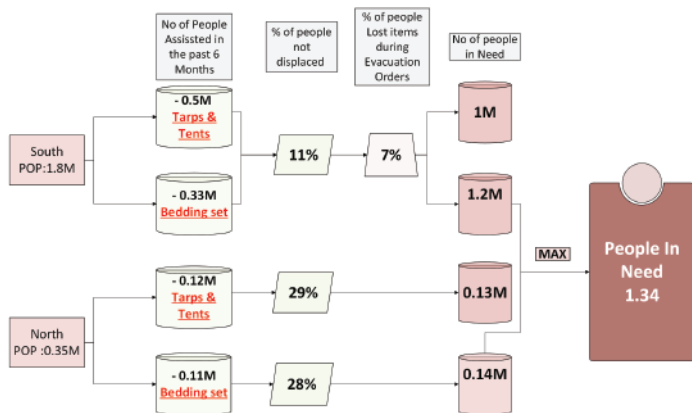
GAZA HUMANITARIAN OVERVIEW/HIGHLIGHTS

The Shelter NFI Cluster response is impeded by severe access constraints that have resulted in an extreme shortage of critical shelter and household NFIs.

In the south in particular there are no stocks of materials, and very few trucks arriving with Shelter NFIs such that we are unable to mount an effective emergency response to support to those who have been displaced, often multiple times. We are also not able to meet winterisation needs, and if a cease-fire occurs it will be impossible to respond with the emergency shelter needs that will likely result from the significant movement of people back to areas of damaged and destroyed homes.

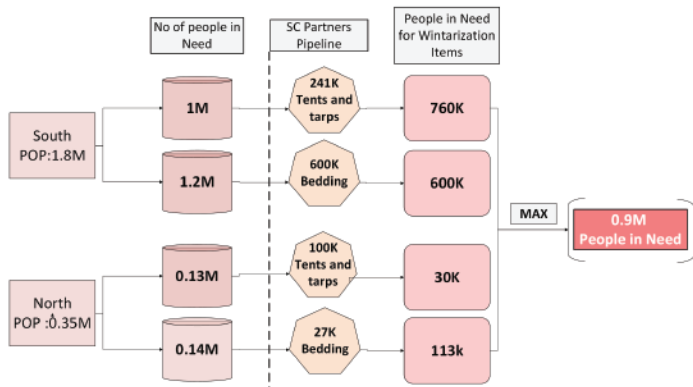
GAP ANALYSIS

The chart below depicts the number of individuals in critical need of shelter materials, excluding those who have not been displaced and remain in their original shelter and is based on OCHA figures. It also details the number of people who have received assistance that has entered Gaza in the past six months, and items that are still in warehouses. Furthermore, the chart provides an account of those who have been forcibly displaced due to evacuation orders and the associated attrition rates during these events.



WINTER GAP ANALYSIS

This chart also includes Shelter Cluster partners' plans to import materials from abroad over the winter and estimates the number of people in urgent need of shelter materials.



CHALLENGES

- Partners are facing challenges getting shelter materials in to the south of Gaza due to imposed access constraints, movement restrictions, and looting of NFIs on their way out of Kerem Shalom (KS). With only one main crossing into the south, and with the incidents including full or partial looting of the shipments, currently partners are hesitant to send items to KS. The Logistics Cluster has opened up the Fence Road/Gate 96 route, but its capacity is a fraction of KS.
 - Partners are still getting items in at Erez, but they are unable to be transported to the South- attempts to get materials from north to south are unsuccessful due to lack of COGAT approvals.
- Gate 96 crossing is currently open, but only a few trucks are entering which has led to a backup of items entering via the Jordan corridor. entering through the Jordanian corridor.
